Findings

- The gap between so-called middle class activism and the movements/aspirations of subordinate groups
- The need to explore complex situations in which the positive/negative influence of neo-liberal ideology has an impact on various groups and individuals

Aims:

- To focus on human relationships and emotions while examining social movements
- To emphasise comparative perspectives while dealing with particular issues such as family, gender relations, literature, and society
- To develop interdisciplinary approaches (such as history, gender studies, and literature)

Problems at the Moment and Aspirations for the Future:

Characteristics of South Asian Studies in Japan

- 1–1. (apparently) declining interest in historical research
- 1–2. focus on specific topics with little consideration of the larger picture or discussion of trends/debates in other areas
- 1–3. meticulous use of statistics (especially in the field of economics/economic history

Future Agenda

2–1 joint projects between Gender Studies centres and Literature Studies centres in South Asian countries, as well as with gender studies scholars in other Asian countries

- 3–1. Insufficient/disorganised information regarding young scholars at various universities
- 3–2. The weak influence of historical studies
- 3–3. Difficulties in deepening interdisciplinary research

- 4–2. On the limit and possibility of discourse analysis
